Boys & Girls Clubs of Benton and Franklin Counties	<i>Teen Club Mentor Program</i>	300 at risk children and teens participate in this teen-driven mentoring program; they develop communication, time management, teamwork, self-confidence, leadership skills.
Catholic Charities Serving Central Washington	<i>Kaleidoscope Play & Learn</i>	101 parents/caregivers receive support to increase positive engagement with and support the development of their children.
Catholic Charities Serving Central Washington	<i>Foster Teen Program</i>	60 foster teens gain post-secondary employment, job training, education, or credentials.
Chaplaincy Health Care	<i>Cork's Place Grief Support</i>	155 children and their parents receive grief support, after the death of a friend or family member, to improve their mental and physical health.
Children's Developmental Center	<i>Applied Behavioral Analysis Program</i>	11 children on the spectrum benefit as their parents receive training and support for their child's social, emotional, and learning needs.
Domestic Violence Services	<i>Housing Assistance</i>	192 people access safe housing as they escape domestic violence.
Domestic Violence Services	<i>Youth Support and Violence Prevention Project</i>	309 youth learn skills to develop positive relationships, and improve communication, time management, and leadership skills.
Elijah Family Homes	<i>Transition to Success</i>	50 parents participate in a 3-year supportive housing program to help them maintain sobriety and stable homes.
Family Learning Center	<i>Empowering Parents of English Language Learners</i>	25 parents, who are refugees, gain language and literacy, pre-employment, and job skills.
Mirror Ministries	<i>Restorative Therapeutic Services for Sex Trafficking Victims</i>	25 vulnerable and foster-involved youth receive support to access resources and gain skills to prevent them from being sexually exploited.
Mirror Ministries	<i>Trafficking Prevention/Intervention for Vulnerable Youth</i>	20 youth access mental and/or behavioral health services to recover from human trafficking.
Second Harvest	<i>Healthy Food Access</i>	12,000 children and parents/caregivers receive food, essential care supplies, and nutrition education materials through Mobile Markets.
Service Peace Warriors	<i>Service Dogs for Veterans</i>	15 veterans suffering from PTSD, who are also parents, increase their health and resiliency as they are matched with a trained service dog.
Support, Advocacy & Resource Center	<i>Prevention Program</i>	14,440 family members are provided with support to prevent or recover from physical and/or emotional harm.
The ARC of Tri-Cities	<i>Advocacy: Parent Navigation, Crisis Intervention, and Parent Support</i>	140 parents/caregivers get resources to promote early learning, social/emotional development, and academic success of their children.
The ARC of Tri-Cities	<i>Buddy Club</i>	175 student peers and students with intellectual and developmental disabilities are matched to develop soft skills and enhance well-being.
Upper Columbia Mission Society of SDA	<i>Tri-Cities Diaper Bank</i>	10,800 parents receive diapers and baby wipes to increase the health of the baby.
